
ON TO THE FUTURE



State Employment Service—to receive help finding a new job, contact the Idaho Department of Labor Office at (208) 332-3570, visit their website <u>http://labor.idaho.gov</u>, or visit a local office for more info.

- Private Employment Service—these are usually listed in the yellow pages; these charge a fee, usually based on the hourly wage or salary of the job you get. Make sure you research these fees ahead of time.
- Apprenticeship Training—often overlooked as an option. Apprenticeships consist of a combination of work & school. The work is often times directly related to your studies or your long-term interest. Many go to school in the same field as part of your work day or in the evening. If you are interested in an Apprenticeship you should contact the state employment service listed above or contact a company in the field you are interested in for more information.

OTHER EDUCATIONAL OPTIONS

INSTEAD OF A 4 YEAR DEGREE

Community Colleges/Technical School Prívate Art Busíness

OPTION #1—COMMUNITY COLLEGE/TECHNICAL SCHOOL

Community Colleges, also referred to as a junior college, or technical college, provide students with education and training in a variety of fields; providing students with the opportunity to acquire certificates, diplomas, and associate's degrees. Many students choose to start at a community college and then transfer to a four year university/college. The cost of tuition is generally lower.

LENGTH—Primarily two years.

OPTION #2—PRIVATE ART

Is an educational institution with a primary focus on the visual arts, especially graphic design, illustration, painting, photography, design, and sculpture.

LENGTH-Varies

OPTION #3—BUSINESS

Is an educational institution that can refer to a two-year school that grants an Associate's degree in various business subjects. Some areas of study include secretarial work, accounting, bookkeeping, and management. Another option is a bachelor's degree in business and then a master's degree in business and/or an MBA (Masters in Business Administration).

LENGTH-Varies

Four year post-secondary educations are not for everyone. In fact, students can often best prepare for some of today's high growth career fields by attending a community college or private technical school. Students who prefer to study courses that relate directly to their career goals and/or students who enjoy a more hands-on approach to education might want to consider a community college or tech school as a post-secondary option.

VISIT THE COUNSELING OFFICE

Learn about college requirements, financial aid, and scholarships.

CONTINUE TAKING CHALLENGING CLASSES

Colleges want students that have challenged themselves academically.

TAKE THE SAT and ACT EXAMS

Take these exams early in the year. Take them multiple times to improve your score. These are usually required for admission.

NARROW DOWN YOUR CHOICES

Make a list of the colleges you would like to attend and rank them #1 (top choice) to #5 (last choice). Between 3 & 5 is recommended. <u>APPLY TO THESE SCHOOLS!</u>

ATTEND COLLEGE FAIRS, OPEN HOUSES and PREVIEWS

Some of the best tips/information regarding scholarships and admissions can be found at these events. (*Contact the counseling*

VISIT COLLEGE CAMPUSES

Always visit the schools you are interested in before you make a final decision. Each school is different, so it's important to make sure it's the right fit.

APPLY FOR ADMISSION

Start early (usually November) if you are interested in early admission and bigger scholarship opportunities.

APPLY for SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships=Free \$\$ for school. Take advantage of the opportunities.

CHECK YOUR EMAIL OFTEN!

New scholarships and college info is sent to your inbox. Make sure you are checking it!

SEMESTER 2 – TAKE CHALLENGING CLASSES

Admission and scholarship committees admire students who challenged themselves throughout their senior year.

CONSIDER RETESTING, IF DISAPPOINTED IN SAT OR ACT SCORF

Often times, your score will increase the second time around, with preparation.

FILE YOUR FAFSA (ASAP)

Filing your FAFSA as soon as possible (Jan. 1^{st)} will increase your odds of getting more aid.

ASK PARENTS/GUARDIANS TO ATTEND FINANCIAL AID NIGHT

Attending financial aid night will help you learn the ins and outs of financial aid. You'll also learn how to get more \$\$.

CHECK APPLICATION and SCHOLARSHIP DEADLINES

It's important to write down all deadlines, so that you don't forget and can get everything in on time.

VISIT COLLEGE CAMPUSES



COLLEGE ENTRANCE EXAMS

An Overview: Test dates and registration deadlines can be found through websites listed below, at the BHS counseling office, and through our BHS counseling website.

PSAT/NMSQT ^{GO TO} <u>COLLEGEBOARD.COM</u> FOR MORE INFO

It's a standardized test that provides firsthand practice for the SAT[®] and lets you know as a student what areas you need to study/practice before you take the SAT[®]. Also, if you take the PSAT your junior year and score high enough you may qualify for the National Merit Scholarship Program.

THE PSAT/NMSQT MEASURES:

- Critical reading skills
- Math problem-solving skills
- Writing skills

THE SAT® GO TO COLLEGEBOARD.COM FOR MORE INFO

The SAT is a globally recognized college admission test that lets you show colleges what you know and how well you can apply that knowledge. If you plan on attending a 4 year university/college you will need to take this exam or the ACT. Plan to take the SAT your junior and/or senior year. It is recommended to take this test more than one time to increase your score. Subject Tests are also available.

THE SAT MEASURES:

- CRITICAL READING SKILLS
 - This includes reading passages and sentence completions.
- MATH PROBLEM-SOLVING SKILLS
 - This includes a short essay and multiple-choice questions on identifying errors and improving grammar and usage.

WRITING SKILLS


- This includes questions on arithmetic operations, algebra, geometry, statistics and probability.

THE ACT GO TO WWW.ACTSTUDENT.ORG FOR MORE INFO

The ACT test assesses high school students' general educational development and their ability to complete college-level work. If you are strong in the Sciences you may consider taking the ACT vs. the SAT.

COLLEGE ADMISSION

WHO GETS IN?

There is no one answer to this one. Some schools have very liberal admission policies while others are very selective. Most schools fall somewhere in between. Colleges are looking for reasons to predict that you will be successful. The general patterns they use are listed in order of importance.

- **1. GRADES IN COLLEGE PREP CLASSES**
- 2. DIFFICULTY OF COURSEWORK
- **3. SAT OR ACT SCORES**
- 4. GRADES IN ALL SUBJECTS
- 5. CLASS RANK

6. WORK/EXTRACURRICULAR

- 7. ESSAY OR WRITING SAMPLE
- 8. AWARDS
- 9. COUNSELOR RECOMMENDATION
- **10. TEACHER RECOMMENDATION**

- **12. ABILITY TO PAY**

ESSAY REQUIREMENT

More selective colleges may have you write a personal essay. These essays usually ask about a significant event that may have changed your life and/or a reflection of who you are. The Counseling Office will have guides to help you in this process. Some colleges may have you write an essay if you applied for admission and the basic requirements were not met. They may ask you to write an essay about why you want to attend their school.

INTERVIEW REQUIREMENT

More selective colleges will ask to interview you as part of their admission selection process. If you are required to do this, come to the BHS counseling office and we can help you practice.

COLLEGE CATALOGS

College catalogs provide you with information regarding admission and graduation requirements of a specific college. It's also a great tool to gain information on what each class is all about. Viewing course descriptions gives you an idea of what you may learn.

COLLEGE VIEWBOOKS

Great visuals that tell you what that school campus is all about.

ARMED FORCES INFORMATION

Information on different opportunities in the armed forces (e.g. Navy, Army, Marines, National Guard)

COLLEGE APPLICATIONS (FOR SOME SCHOOLS)

Some schools provide us with paper applications. Stop by the counseling office for more info. The most common way of submitting a college application is via the web.

SAT & ACT REGISTRATION & INFO

The counseling office has study guides and registration material if you plan on taking the SAT and/or ACT. Talk to the counselor for more info.

LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION

If you plan on applying for scholarships and/or college, some may require you to have a letter of recommendation. In order to acquire a letter of recommendation from a counselor or teacher, you will need to submit a request to them **<u>TWO WEEKS IN ADVANCE.</u>**

SCHOLARSHIP FILE

Check with the BHS counseling office for information on local scholarships available. Some applications may be located in the office.
